

Budget for Justice - A Justice Hub Initiative

The objective behind setting up the *Budget for Justice* portal is to enhance the accessibility and interpretability of key budget datasets around law and justice (budget data on courts, police, prison, legal aid, women & child protection, etc). As part of this initiative, we would like to conduct in-depth research on the gaps that prevent us from exploring and using budget datasets and build better tools and processes that can help us use the budget datasets in the most effective ways to facilitate a culture on data-use and data-creation.

About the dataset

The dataset contains time series data of the union budgets for schemes concerning the law and justice sector. It includes expenditure data on schemes under different ministries and departments, such as:

- 1. Ministry of Law and Justice
- 2. Department of Police
- 3. Ministry of Home Affairs
- 4. Ministry of Women and Child Development

All budget related information can be explored at three levels:

- 1. Budget for a Ministry/Department
- 2. Budget for specific categories of schemes (These categories are defined in the budget documents)
- 3. Budget for specific schemes

Dataset Source

- All budget datasets have been sourced from <u>OpenBudgetsIndia</u> Platform.
- All scheme related metadata (non-budget information such as scheme description, type of scheme, etc) have been sourced from the respective websites of the ministry and department.

Data curation methodology

The data has been curated for specific schemes using the budget document available on <u>OpenBudgetsIndia</u> for the financial years 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22. The process we followed to curate this datasheet is as follows:



Step 1 - Finding the relevant schemes in the areas of Law and Justice

- We used certain tags to search for schemes in the Open Budgets India database. The list of tags is as follows:
 - Law and Justice
 - Police
 - Rights
 - Jails
 - Children
 - Women
 - \circ Protection
 - Justice
 - Legal
 - Courts
- We held discussions with stakeholders from civil society engaged in budgetary analysis to discuss scheme names that we should include as part of the Budget for Justice initiative as per their suggestions.

Step 2 - Locating the Departments/Ministries that manage the budget for these selected schemes

- We searched for these tags using the search feature available on the <u>Union Budget</u> <u>Explorer</u> to find names of the schemes.
- The search feature allows us to search for textual information across these three columns:
 - Ministries/Departments
 - Heads of Expenditure
 - Detailed Heads of Expenditure
- Using the search feature, we were able to locate the department/ministries which contain the budgetary information for the selected schemes

Step 3 - Downloading the Department/Ministry budget data for the last 6 years

- To get the budget heads for the selected departments, we used the search feature on the Open Budgets India platform to find the budget documents for the last 6 years.
- We downloaded all budget data for these departments from 2017-18 onwards. The budget data for 2016-17 is part of the 2017-18 budget document.

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- For most schemes, the budget data was available in either CSV or XLS[x] formats, but we had to work with PDF documents to curate data for certain financial years.
- For the financial year 2021-22, only the budget estimates are available.
- The data published before the above mentioned period (2016-17 onwards) follows different nomenclature and structure and therefore cannot be easily compared with the data taken into consideration.

Step 4 - Creating a data standard to curate information under specific budget heads

We came up with a *data standard* to simplify the process of data curation. The data points which we collected from the budget documents, per scheme, are as follows:

- 1. Ministry/Department
- 2. Heads of Expenditure
- 3. Detailed Heads of Expenditure (Scheme Name)
- 4. Budget
 - a. Revenue
 - b. Capital
 - c. Total
- 5. Revised
 - a. Revenue
 - b. Capital
 - c. Total
- 6. Actual
 - a. Revenue
 - b. Capital
 - c. Total

Step 5 - Creating scheme files to store all relevant information for each scheme

Using the <u>master list of schemes</u>, we created separate files for each scheme for storing the budget information for that scheme. This structure allows us to store and maintain rich metadata per scheme.

Rules to Inclusion of Schemes

1. There are certain schemes for which the data is not maintained consistently in the last 6 years majorly because they were either discontinued or they started after 2016-17.



We're only maintaining separate data files for schemes which have been functional since 2016-17.

- 2. We're including schemes that were started post 2016-17 but were formed by combining older schemes that were functional since 2016-17.
 - a. For instance, the budget for Swadhar Greh, Ujjawala, Working Women Hostel, Women Helpline, One Stop Center, Mahila Police Volunteers, Home for Widows were combined in the budget 2021-22 under the umbrella scheme SAMBAL under Mission Shakti. Therefore, the data for these schemes are from financial year 2016-17 to 2020-21, except for Mahila Police Volunteers and Home for Widows for which the data is available from financial year 2019-20 to 2020-21.

Note: This is not an exhaustive list, we'll be working with our partners to include more schemes and update the list periodically.

Type of Indicators

The budget data can be explored using several indicators that are available on the portal. These are defined as follows:

- 1. **Budget Estimates:** The amount of money allocated in the Budget for a particular fiscal year to any ministry or scheme.
- 2. **Revised Estimates:** A mid-year evaluation of potential expenditures that take into account spending trends, new services, and new instruments of services, among other things.
- 3. **Actual Expenditure:** The amount of money spent in a particular fiscal year on ministry, department or scheme.
- 4. Actual Expenditure of Ministry as a percentage of Total Actual Expenditure of the Financial Year: It is a ratio of Actual Expenditure of the Ministry / Department and Total Actual Expenditure of the Financial Year. *This indicator is calculated for all ministries/departments.*
- 5. Actual Expenditure as a percentage of Ministry: This gives us an estimate of the share each scheme / detailed head of expenditure has as a part of total expenditure of the ministry or department. *This indicator is calculated for all schemes and scheme categories.*
- 6. **Fund Utilisation:** This indicator gives us the information on the extent to which the allocated money has been utilised over a time period. It is a ratio of Actual Expenditure



and Revised Estimate. The revised estimates being the proxy to funds disbursed and actual expenditure being the funds used.

*For the schemes under the Ministry of Home Affairs and Ministry of Women and Child Development, we're not calculating the Actual Expenditure as a percentage of Ministry/Department since we haven't curated data for all schemes under these ministries.
